Canadian Justice Minister addresses criminalization of HIV non-disclosure in World AIDS Day statement

Jody Wilson-Raybould, Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada, released a statement on World AIDS Day promising to investigate how the criminal law in Canada deals with cases of HIV non-disclosure, and acknowledged that the current system is discouraging people from seeking HIV testing and treatment.

People living with HIV who do not disclose their status to a partner prior to sexual activity can be charged in Canada with aggravated sexual assault. As of December 2015, more than 170 people have faced these charges in Canada. The way the law is being used in Canada does not reflect the science of HIV as people are being charged even when there is no risk of HIV transmission.

World AIDS Day Statement from the Honourable Jody Wilson-Raybould

"World AIDS Day is a time to reflect on the impact that HIV/AIDS has had on Canadians, and to give thanks to the many dedicated people who work to prevent this disease and help people get the care and support they need.

It is also a time to recognize the tremendous medical advances that have been made since the first World AIDS Day was held in 1988. HIV treatment has slowed disease progression to the point that, for many, HIV infection can now be regarded as a chronic, manageable condition.

Still, the over-criminalization of HIV non-disclosure discourages many individuals from being tested and seeking treatment, and further stigmatizes those living with HIV or AIDS. Just as treatment has progressed, the criminal justice system must adapt to better reflect the current scientific evidence on the realities of this disease.

Over the coming months, I intend to work with my provincial and territorial counterparts, affected communities and medical professionals to examine the criminal justice system's response to non-disclosure of HIV status. This could include a review of existing charging and prosecution practices, as well as the possible development of prosecutorial guidelines. I also look forward to working with Member of Parliament Randy Boissonnault, Special Advisor to the Prime Minister on LGBTQ2 issues, in his continued efforts to engage Canadians on important issues such as this one.

On World AIDS Day, we should all share in the commitment to reduce stigma and discrimination against those living with HIV or AIDS."

"Callous, Cold and Deliberately Duplicitous"

The representation of HIV Criminalization in Canadian Newspapers

A team of researchers from the University of Toronto, York University and Lakehead University released a study in November that explores how mainstream Canadian newspapers are covering the criminalization of HIV non-disclosure, particularly viewed through the lenses of racism and anti-immigrant discourse.

The study found that racialized people living with HIV and newcomers to Canada living with HIV are drastically overrepresented in media coverage of HIV non-disclosure criminal charges. For example, while black men in Canada account for 20% of people who have been charged with HIV non-disclosure, 68% of Canadian newspaper articles about criminal charges relating to HIV non-disclosure since 1989 have focused on black men. Almost half (49%) of all coverage since 1989 has focused on just 4 cases, all involving men who immigrated to Canada from African and Caribbean countries. Of the 1680 articles about HIV non-disclosure since 1989, 820 were about these four men.

Measuring Canada's Progress on the 90-90-90 HIV Targets

The following is an abridged version of a report released by Health Canada on World AIDS Day measuring Canada's progress on the United Nations 90-90-90 campaign. Increased uptake of HIV testing and early access to antiretroviral treatment are critical to stopping the spread of HIV and ending the AIDS epidemic. Timely initiation of treatment and sustained engagement in HIV care are important to achieving viral load suppression, which is a key marker for successful treatment. This has individual benefits by preventing HIV-related illness and optimizing health, and also reduces the potential for onward HIV transmission in the community.

The Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) and the World Health Organization have established global targets that will generate momentum towards the elimination of AIDS as a public health threat by 2030. Canada supports these targets, including the 90-90-90 targets that by 2020, 90% of all people living with HIV know their status, 90% of those diagnosed receive antiretroviral treatment, and 90% of those on treatment achieve viral suppression. Reporting on these targets supports national responses to HIV/AIDS, promotes the use of data in new ways to guide HIV prevention and care efforts, and helps to identify gaps and opportunities for intervention.

At the end of 2014, an estimated 65,040 persons (plausible range: 53,980 to 76,100) were living with HIV in Canada. Of persons living with HIV, an estimated 52,220 (plausible range: 47,230 to 57,440) were diagnosed, 39,790 (plausible range: 36,470 to 43,140) were on antiretroviral therapy, and 35,350 (plausible range: 32,430 to 38,260) had suppressed viral load. An estimated 80% (73% to 87%) of persons living with HIV were diagnosed, 76% (70% to 82%) of persons diagnosed with HIV were on treatment, and 89% (84% to 93%) of persons on treatment had suppressed viral load (Figure 1). Canada's 90-90-90 estimates lie within the range reported by other developed countries such as Australia, the United States, and the countries of Western Europe.

At 8:00 am on Thursday, December 1, a group of nine PARN volunteers placed 116 red scarves on lamp posts in downtown Peterborough.







The Red Scarf Project also gave us an opportunity to connect with members of the community who we had not met before, knitters from throughout Peterborough and the Four Counties who chose to give their time to PARN. We thank everyone who contributed to the success of the Red Scarf Project!



On World AIDS Day, people arrived in downtown Peterborough to find the scarves lining George Street like giant red ribbons. 

HIV Testing in Peterborough and the Four Counties

"The biggest risk is not knowing"

PARN kicked off AIDS Awareness Week on Thursday, November 24 with a testing campaign in partnership with the Positive Care Clinic. People concerned about their HIV status were encouraged to come to PARN for a test, with registered nurses and PARN peers living with HIV on hand to answer questions.

This year marks 20 years since the introduction of Anti-retroviral Therapies (ART). The new treatments introduced in 1996 changed HIV from a deadly virus to a chronic disease for people with access to treatment. Adherence to treatment results in what is called an "undetectable viral load", which means that the person no longer has enough of the virus in their body to transmit to someone else.






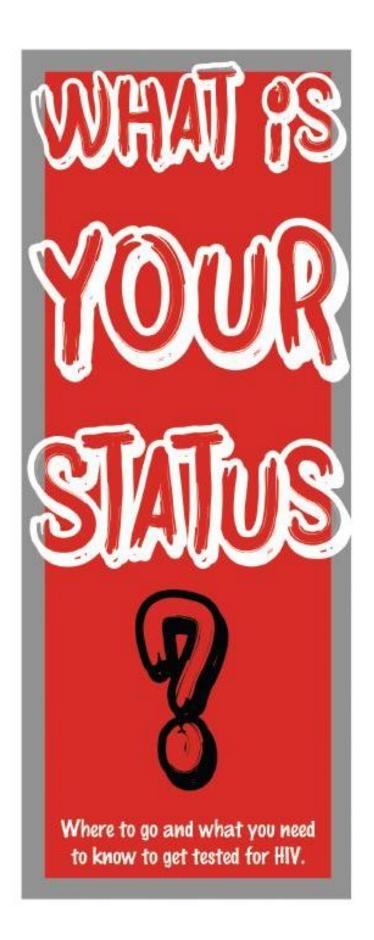
