



Reporting Back From Central East Opening Doors

Each year PARN, in partnership with The AIDS Committee of Durham Region, The Positive Care Clinic, John Howard Society of Durham Region and The Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge District Health Unit hosts our annual conference. The conference aims to meet three goals:

- To enhance the local community capacity to provide effective counselling and support to people living with and/or affected by HIV and/or AIDS.
- 2. To promote meaningful partnerships between service providers, people living with HIV and/or AIDS, and other community members to identify and meet the needs of local community.
- 3. To promote anti-oppression and social determinants of health approaches to HIV and/or AIDS related support and counselling. The Central East Opening Doors Committee looks forward year after year to offering a supportive and creative learning opportunity that fosters an open dialogue and a fresh outlook on HIV.

In the News: HIV Care Cascade

New York City finds gaps in the HIV cascade of care linked to reduced survival

Researchers in Canada and other high-income countries estimate that many HIV-positive people who are diagnosed shortly after infection, begin taking treatment (ART) and maintain regular visits to their doctor(s) are likely to have a near-normal life span.

Going from being diagnosed with HIV to achieving and maintaining an undetectable viral load involves many steps—such as getting into care, receiving an offer of ART, taking treatment every day as directed and keeping regular clinic and laboratory appointments. The entire process has several names: the HIV care continuum, the HIV cascade of care or, simply, the cascade.

Studies in high-income countries/regions have found that there are gaps between each stage of the cascade, whereby not everyone moves from one stage to the next. Bridging these gaps is vital if people are to have better health and realize the long-term survival benefit of ART.

Researchers in New York City have sifted through health-related information collected from tens of thousands of HIV-positive people between 2007 and 2013 to assess their passage through the cascade of care. The researchers focused on people who died and examined data from at least one year before their death. They found gaps in the cascade of care for a large proportion of people who died. For instance, only 40% of people who died had an undetectable viral load in the year prior to their death. Furthermore, nearly half of the deaths that occurred were from HIV-related causes, suggesting a large degree of immunological dysfunction. All of this is suggestive of one or more of the following issues having played some role in the deaths of participants: co-existing health issues; barriers to accessing HIV care and treatment; and poor adherence to ART.

Fast Facts

60% of HIV-positive people in New York City who died had not been virally suppressed through treatment.

Rates of viral suppression lowest among women, young people, black and Hispanic people, as well as people in low-income neighbourhoods.

Researchers call for programs to link HIV-positive people to treatment and care, and to support taking medication every day.

The New York City study underscores that gaps in the HIV cascade of care continue to occur even in high-income countries. The study's findings are disappointing but the researchers said that their results "should be used to inspire and support novel strategies to better support the progress of people engaged in care through the latter stages of the care continuum to [achieve and maintain] viral suppression."




