September 27 is National Gay Men's HIV/AIDS Awareness Day in the USA. This national awareness day was first launched in 2008 by the National Association of People with AIDS (NAPWA), as a way to draw attention to the disproportionate impact of the HIV/AIDS epidemic on gay men. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), about 57% of the 1.1 million people living with HIV in the United States are gay and bisexual men, even though they only account for approximately 2% of the overall population. HIV Does Define Me: There, I've Said It.

"It's the clarion call of many a budding activist: "HIV does not define me." You must have read it a hundred times. It's an admirable sentiment too. It speaks of empowerment, of mastering challenge, of defiance, of retaining a clear sense of identity and of priorities.

At the same time, I can't help but think that, manageable condition or not, HIV DOES define me, and many others. It shapes our lives. Pre-diagnosis years, I suspect, are universally much different to post-diagnosis years. That's even more so for long term survivors who now constitute a large faction within the HIV community and who inevitably bear scars from living through the worst years of the epidemic. And, as a result of criminalization, we can be charged with serious offences our HIV-negative neighbours cannot. We grapple with stigma too in all its forms that our neighbours cannot even comprehend. Living with HIV IS different."

Making a point: safe disposal of used needles is essential

"There was a feeling of celebration about the growth and success of the Undetectable = Untransmittable campaign, balanced with the recognition that there is still so much to be done, particularly when it comes to access to treatment."

"The chance of any HIV-positive person with an undetectable viral load transmitting the virus to a sexual partner is scientifically equivalent to zero, researchers confirmed at the 22nd International AIDS Conference (AIDS 2018) in Amsterdam." - Results of the PARTNER 2 study were announced at AIDS 2018 Conference. The study found no transmissions between gay couples where the HIV-positive partner had a viral load under 200 copies/ml – even though there were nearly 77,000 acts of condomless sex between them. Since 2016, the Red Scarf Project has raised awareness around HIV support and prevention while also serving the needs of our communities in the winter months. On December 1, 2018, Red Scarves will be placed like giant red ribbons on lampposts throughout the counties of Peterborough, Haliburton, Northumberland and City of Kawartha Lakes for World AIDS Day. If someone is cold, they can take a scarf.

Last year, 50 members of the community donated 251 scarves to the Red Scarf Project and we were able to expand the campaign outside of Peterborough and into Northumberland County and the City of Kawartha Lakes!

To build on our successful 2017, we are getting a head start on the 2018 Red Scarf Project. We are looking for donations of scarves that are red and approximately 6" by 60" in size, but the pattern is completely your choice! Take Back the Night 2018 in the Four Counties

The Kawartha Sexual Assault Centre, Fleming College and partner organizations are encouraging community members to step up, speak out and take a stand against sexual violence.

This candlelight vigil and walk, which will take place in Peterborough, Lindsay, Cobourg and Haliburton, welcomes survivors of sexual violence and harassment, their supporters and allies to join together in solidarity. In the wake of local issues of sexual assault, online luring and sexual harassment, changes to campus policies on sexual violence and harassment, and recent high profile sexual assault trials, the Centre and College welcome participants to join together to build a more healing and inclusive community.

The annual Take Back the Night event will take place starting at 7 p.m. on Thursday, September 20, 2018. This free event includes a rally with speeches, musical performances, and spoken word poetry followed by the 'Light Your Way' solidarity walk at 7:30 p.m. Come early for pre-rally poster making, supplies available on site!

Get ready for Take Back the Night on the evening of Wednesday September 19 at Haliburton Highlands Secondary School, beginning with refreshments and information booths in the lobby at 6:00 pm with a screening of the film "A Better Man" to play at 6:30 pm. This film is for a 14+ audience. Following the screening, there will be a panel discussion with community social service providers to create a dialogue around the issue of sexual violence. Childcare will be provided by Kawartha Sexual Assault Centre volunteers.

Zita Catherine Ginies - 1951-2018

Some of you will have already heard that Zita Catherine Ginies died on Tuesday, August 28. She was a friend and a big part of our PFLAG work.



Catherine was brilliant on the computer and designed our web site and set up the Facebook account. She was equally good with people like leading a sharing meeting or talking to kids and adults at Health Fairs and Workshops. After seeing a film called Gen Silent about the fears and problems of LGBTQ seniors, she initiated the work to help eliminate the need to go back in the closet. There is more, like volunteering at a LGBTQ Workshop in Warkworth Institute, a medium federal prison for two years and the very hard work of the Pre-Pride Brunch.


