PARN provides a range of services for people living with HIV and/or Hep C and people affected by HIV and/or Hep C. PARN works to promote the well-being and independence of people living with or at risk for HIV and/or Hep C in the counties of Peterborough, Northumberland, Haliburton and Kawartha Lakes by providing services such as: counseling, workshops, and information on progression and treatment of the condition for themselves and their families; referrals to other service providers; basic necessities to those in need; and assistance with other health issues.

Positive Care Clinic - Every Tuesday & Thursday @ PARN

The Positive Care Clinic provides HIV and hepatitis C testing and treatment in Peterborough at the PARN site on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The clinic is provided through a partnership between Lakeridge Health and PARN.

The Positive Care Clinic provides individual assessment and follow-up care, nutrition and medication counselling, laboratory work (blood work), and education opportunities. Services are fully funded by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care.

Kim's last day will be Friday, January 31, 2020. Over the coming weeks the board will establish a leadership team and develop a process to fill the executive director position. We are confident that Kim and the staff team will make this a smooth transition for our clients, partners and supporters.

Re-Introducing Charles Shamess

Charles Shamess - who has worked off-and-on with PARN since its inception - will be serving as the agency's Interim Executive Director.

In 1987, Charles was part of a small group of volunteers whose concern about HIV/AIDS in Peterborough led to the founding of PARN. Since that time, Charles has become one of the architects of the HIV/AIDS response in Ontario.

While volunteering with PARN in the early days of the agency, Charles was working as a Mental Health Promoter and Educator for the Peterborough branch of the Canadian Mental Health Association. In the year 2000, Charles joined PARN as an employee, taking on the role of Education Coordinator.



During Charles' time as PARN's Education Coordinator, the agency's work in the community expanded greatly. Charles was tasked with managing PARN's participation in both the newly developed Four Counties Needle Exchange Coalition (which would later become Harm Reduction Works @ PARN) and the fledgling Rainbow Youth Coalition, which had just been launched in 1998.

In November 2006, Charles joined the Public Health Agency of Canada's AIDS Community Action Program (ACAP) and Hepatitis C program as a program consultant. Charles was responsible for program management and oversight of ACAP funded programs throughout Ontario.

In 2008, Charles became Director of the Ontario HIV and Substance Use Training Program (now known as the Ontario Harm Reduction Network), which trains addictions, mental health and allied social services across Ontario on the links between HIV transmission and substance use and mental health issues.

Charles then became the first Director of the Ontario HIV Treatment Network's (OHTN) Evidence-Based Practice Unit in February 2010. Charles was responsible for developing a new unit within the OHTN to support data-collection, analysis and evaluation of the community-based response to HIV in Ontario (of which PARN is part).

In 2012, Charles became the Director of Community and Volunteer Programs at Fife House in Toronto which provides supportive housing environments for people living with HIV and/or AIDS.


Charles returned to Peterborough in 2016 to coordinate the Haliburton, Kawartha Lakes, Northumberland Drug Strategy. In the summer of 2018, Charles moved into a new pilot position managing PARN's Harm Reduction Works program.

In early 2019, Charles took on the role of Director with the Sault St. Marie and Area Drug Strategy. He returns to PARN on January 20, 2020.



Offering expedited, barrier-free treatment and counseling for patients who are addicted to alcohol or opioids, Peterborough Regional Health Centre's Rapid Access Addiction Medicine (RAAM) clinic is staffed by PRHC doctors and nurses and FourCAST addiction counselors, and serves clients from Peterborough, Kawartha Lakes, Northumberland and Haliburton.

> Treatment and counseling are available free of charge on a walk-in basis. Referrals from other healthcare providers are welcome, but not necessary.
