PARN provides a range of services for people living with HIV and/or Hep C and people affected by HIV and/or Hep C. PARN works to promote the well-being and independence of people living with or at risk for HIV and/or Hep C in the counties of Peterborough, Northumberland, Haliburton and Kawartha Lakes by providing services such as: counseling, workshops, and information on progression and treatment of the condition for themselves and their families; referrals to other service providers; basic necessities to those in need; and assistance with other health issues.

Positive Care Clinic - Every Tuesday & Thursday @ PARN

The Positive Care Clinic provides HIV and hepatitis C testing and treatment in Peterborough at the PARN site on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The clinic is provided through a partnership between Lakeridge Health and PARN.

The Positive Care Clinic provides individual assessment and follow-up care, nutrition and medication counselling, laboratory work (blood work), and education opportunities. Services are fully funded by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care.




Film Review - Killing Patient Zero

In 1980, Air Canada flight attendant Gaetan Dugas was diagnosed with a rare skin cancer called Kaposi's Sarcoma. This was called "gay cancer" at the time, as AIDS had yet to be identified. In 1982, Dugas was interviewed by the American Center for Disease Control about his sexual history/partners to assist with a cluster study with all of the men that were living with AIDS at the time. Dugas was very willing to help out in any way he could, even giving his address book to the CDC so they could have all the information they needed.





Film Review - Killing Patient Zero

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Dugas was identified in the study with the letter "O", which represented the fact that he lived "Outside of California". Unfortunately, this was confused with the number "O", and Dugas became erroneously known as the "Patient Zero" of the AIDS epidemic in North America. This unfair reputation was cemented by the publication of And the Band Played On by San Francisco writer Randy Shilts in 1987. Though Dugas' story is only mentioned on 11 pages of the book, a publicist felt that the book would sell more copies if the promotion focused on the Patient Zero story.

This story forms the basis of Killing Patient Zero, a 2019 documentary film by Laurie Lynd that was screened at Peterborough's ReFrame Film Festival this past January. This film shines a light on a very emotional time when fear and misinformation were helping drive the AIDS epidemic. Much like the epidemic itself, the film shows how homophobia contributed to the demonization of Gaetan Dugas.

Gaetan Dugas was born February 20, 1953. He was adopted and lived in Quebec City with his large, loving family. He grew up near an airport and fell in love with planes at an early age. His dreams of flying would eventually come true when he got a job as a flight attendant with Air Canada when he was 22 years old. His frequent travel led to the now-debunked claim that he was Patient Zero.

The film does a great job of showing how this mistake was made, and makes great efforts to clear up the misunderstandings around Dugas and his place in the history of HIV/AIDS in North America. Featuring interviews with more than 30 people – including friends of Dugas and researchers and scientists – Killing Patient Zero makes it clear that Dugas was not the epicentre of the HIV/AIDS crisis in North America by showing how the virus had actually been circulating in the United States since at least 1970, and that the strain of virus Dugas was living with was not related to the strain of virus detected in the "cluster" around him.



Gaetan Dugas passed away due to AIDS-related complications in March 30, 1984. He was 31 years old. He never lived to see his name associated with the beginnings of HIV in North America, but this film provides him with the redemption he deserves.

Hep C Micro Elimination through Point of Care Rapid Testing

Rapid testing for the Hepatitis C Virus (HCV) is a blood test that takes a small drop of blood from your finger to check for the presence of Hepatitis C antibodies. The test measures the body's response to an exposure, also known as an antibody test. This new technology provides test results in 20 minutes and is more than 98% accurate. Also known as Point of Care (POC) testing, this testing practice for HCV was approved in January 17, 2017 by Health Canada. The rapid tests are used in clinics, hospitals, mobile testing units and by outreach teams (CATIE, 2017).



The Positive Care Clinic, at the PARN location on 159 King St., plans to launch its rapid testing program for both HCV and HIV by March 2020. Like Hepatitis C, a rapid HIV test checks for antibodies to HIV in the blood (CATIE, 2015). The clinic nurses, Kara and Tobin, know how important it is to reduce stigma, respect the patient, and to take the time to provide the necessary information needed for testing and treatment. Part of Kara's service delivery at the Positive Care Clinic includes outreach testing to make it more accessible for everyone in community to have access to this rapid test.

The rapid testing program through the clinic will be offered during outreach, in partnership with PARN and their outreach team. Rapid testing is very important because it's easy, fast, and confidential, while bringing health care to community. The goal with rapid testing is that some of the barriers that are experienced in community can be broken down, so that all will have equitable access to health care services.

Many people can run into barriers or challenges while thinking about getting testing done. Some people may not know or may not think they are at risk, some might be afraid to know, people might not want to be outed on their status, and travel to appointments might be an issue. That is why the outreach aspect of rapid testing is so valuable.

Outreach testing is part of micro elimination of the HCV virus. It is something Canada, along with the World Health Organization is attempting to achieve elimination. Micro elimination of Hepatitis C speaks to "eliminating hepatitis C for defined segments of the population as a strategy to incrementally achieve national elimination" (CATIE, 2020). This means focusing on eliminating the Hepatitis C for community members who might be at risk of exposure and should access the rapid testing.

Hep C Micro Elimination through Point of Care Rapid Testing

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This can include people who are homeless or under housed, any street-involved youth, people involved with the correctional system, people with lack of access to proper tattoo and/or piercing equipment, and any person who uses drugs.

Getting tested and knowing your status is an important part of harm reduction practice. Risk to HCV and HIV exposure includes sharing drug-use equipment, and so access to new, one time use supplies is an important aspect in prevention of the transmission of HCV and HIV. The nurses at the Positive Care Clinic can refer their patients to PARN to access free drug-use equipment as part of supporting the harm reduction approach. Similarly, community members using harm reduction services at PARN are encouraged to connect with the Positive Care Clinic for testing. When asked if there was anything Kara from the clinic would want for our community, it would be to "know your status" (Kara,2020). Remember, there is no vaccine for Hepatitis C, and so it is possible to get it again.

Testing at the Positive Care Clinic is available to everyone in community. If you feel like you are at risk for HCV or HIV and want a rapid test, or you have questions about the process, come to 159 King Street floor #305 Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9am-4pm. Kara is a friendly Registered Nurse that has worked in the Positive Care Clinic for over 10 years with her co-worker Tobin. While talking with Kara you can tell she is very friendly and honest in her approach. Kara partners closely with the PARN team that is also available to answer your questions in a private and confidential space.





What Participants Said ...



Respondents want the service providers in Peterborough to know that the risks associated with street-based sex work are connected to lack of housing and safe space, and their basic needs aren't being met.



"(emergency contraception) is a big one for me, sometimes I don't get protection. They can take it off without notice."



"A phone would be helpful to at least be able to call 911 or police."



"... I have a place to go but I see workers that don't...Can you provide a safe place for people to sleep without worry for an hour? ..."



"I'd like to be able to text in the license plate of the vehicle I am getting into to some type of dispatch. It's nice to have someone watching over you"

Everyone Has a Role Preventing the Spread of COVID-19

While Risk Remains Low, Community Advised to Prepare

While there are still no local cases and the risk of severe illness remains low, Peterborough Public Health is advising organizations and local residents that now is the time to get ready for the arrival of COVID-19 in our area.



"Since there isn't a vaccine developed yet, we will be mostly relying on behaviour changes to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in our community. We are just now at the tipping point where non-travel related transmission may start to occur in Ontario," said Dr. Rosana Salvaterra, Medical Officer of Health. "Peterborough-area residents are known for their ability to pull together in demanding situations, so we are counting on everyone to do their part and protect their families and our most vulnerable groups from COVID-19."

Peterborough Public Health has updated its website with clear steps residents and local organizations can take to prepare for COVID-19 and prevent spreading the virus: https://www.peterboroughpublichealth.ca/your-health/diseases-infections-immunization/diseases-and-infections/novel-coronavirus-2019-ncov/

- For individuals and families, their focus should be on personal practices such as proper handwashing, covering coughs and sneezes, not sharing water bottles, straws, etc., and staying home when sick. If you get sick with respiratory symptoms and think you may have COVID 19, please call Peterborough Public Health at 705-743-1000, ext. 401 to speak with a nurse, or after business hours, call Telehealth Ontario at 1-866-797-0000. - In addition to preventing the spread of COVID-19, there are actions people can take to stay healthy during the

- For businesses and organizations, now is the time to complete Continuity of Operations plans in case of high absenteeism, consider cross-training staff for essential roles, and increase cleaning of workspaces. - For those considering travel abroad, please visit the Government of Canada website for current travel advisories.

"Older adults and those with underlying medical conditions are the ones at greatest risk of severe illness from COVID-19," explained Dr. Salvaterra. "With our high population of seniors and many local residents suffering the effects of poorhealth due to low-income, we will be working closely with the partner agencies who support them to put in place as many protective factors as possible."

Dr. Salvaterra noted that it is also critical at this time to keep our healthcare workers as safe as possible, and that Peterborough Public Health will work with local health service partners to identify the right strategies that will protect existing healthcare resources and also meet any increased demand for testing or follow-up due to COVID-19 illnesses.
